Education Update

This year presented a slew of new challenges for the education committee. Never knowing what the restrictions would be at any given time period, we managed to plan a great deal of virtual education in the early months, and we are now able to offer in person classes again.

Being a recertification year for appraisal licenses in PA and other states, continuing education was the primary focus. In addition to the mandatory 7 Hour USPAP Update, 2 Hour PA Rules and Regulations and 2 Hour NJ Rules and Regulations courses, we were also able to offer Land Valuation: Tips and Trends, and Xtreme Appraising: Valuing CRE in a Down Market. These CE seminars were all offered virtually.

As per usual, the pinnacle of our education offerings was the 7th Annual Real Estate Trends seminar, featuring experts from our region, as well as all over the country. Since we were offering it virtually and it is very difficult to spend a full 7 hours on a Zoom call, we were able to break it down into more tolerable 3.5-hour chunks. In addition to

Sessions A and B, this year, we were able to add a Session C which focused on interesting topics and speakers geared towards residential appraising. We had a wonderful turnout for this added session and hope to be able to continue to offer education opportunities for our residential appraisers.

With restrictions lifting, we are thrilled to be back in person for education! Our first in person seminar will be a great session of Condemnation Appraising: Principles and Applications being taught by Vince Dowling on September 22-24 in King of Prussia. We hope to see a lot of folks there to enjoy in-person education once more.

University Relations Update Ed Falkowski III, MAI, SRA

Like most aspects of life over the past ± 15 months, the COVID-19 pandemic has certainly "altered" our approach to University Relations. While we are very much looking forward to going back to various campuses in the Fall to resume in-person presentations, we made best efforts to keep the train rolling forward.

Temple University, as many of you know, has been our longest-standing relationship. The URC has certainly benefited from a strong relationship with David Wilk, MAI, CRE, FRICS, the Director of the Real Estate Program for the Fox School of Business at Temple,



as well as our previously forged relationship with the Temple Real Estate Organization (TREO). As the spring time is generally the URC's "slow time" with regards to university outreach efforts, we have maintained our presence at Temple by keeping in touch with TREO members both past and present as well as being present in several TREO meetings/presentations. My discussions with TREO representatives have resulted in a unanimous excitement for our live and in-person return to Alter Hall in the Fall! Also, the URC has worked with several TREO members in getting placed with local real estate appraisal firms and this continues our success from prior years!

Multiple chapter members have inquired about our connections with Penn State University and I have been coordinating with them regarding any/all interest that PSU graduates may have in the space of real estate valuation. They too are looking forward to hosting us live in



the Fall on the heels of our success at their virtual "boot camp" last Fall and with the level of interest that our chapter has shown in hiring/recruiting their students. As a reminder, both Penn State and Temple have been accredited by the AQB and both schools allow graduates to have a majority of their Qualifying Education (QE) hours upon graduation – what a great benefit!



We have also stoked the fire at Lehigh University. I was tapped to be a mentor in their long-standing Collins Family Scholarship Real Estate Capstone competition. After several years of being a judge, I found that being "on the other side

of the table" was equally as rewarding and forged good bonds with students, judges and Lehigh faculty. In fact, Lehigh has recently reached out to me about being a part of a "virtual speaker series" that they will hold in the fall and they are very excited about promoting their AQB accreditation as well. Of course, while we enjoy any and all mediums to reach the students, we will be further inquiring about visiting campus live as we feel that's where we are "maximally productive"!

Additionally, work is well underway to reach out to Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) in an attempt to broaden the URC's outreach and to offer a very viable career alternative to additional Universities and Colleges. This effort is being led by our own Carlo Batts, MAI and I have linked him with several members on the AI National University Relations Committee on which I sit to help foster additional ideas and strategies. Anyone who is interested in this endeavor is encouraged to contact both Carlo and me!

Speaking about the AI National University Relations Committee, we are really making solid progress on multiple fronts. The committee is led by Ryan Zink, MAI of Tampa, FL. In my professional career, I don't know that I've ever met anyone who does as much for the AI as he does. It's truly inspiring! He has helped in our efforts for recruiting new Universities to get AQB accredited, our HBCU initiatives, the new AI University ambassador program as well as multiple other initiatives which are getting off of the ground.

Again, I know that nothing has been "typical" since the beginning of the pandemic and Walt, Christin, Joe and I would like nothing more than to resume our in-person discussions with these (and other) Universities. We truly feel that the appraisal profession is a viable career opportunity and we're seeing positive results from our efforts (namely new entrants into the appraisal workforce and, ultimately, the Appraisal Institute!). Conservation Easements Updates

Vice President Susanne Curran MAI, AI-GRS has been extremely active in the area of conservation easements. She served as the sole Review Appraiser/Consultant supporting the US Senate Finance Committee's Comprehensive report into over 660 conservation easement syndication fraud cases over a three-year investigation centered in the Southeast US. The Senate Finance Committee Report of August 2020 is attached, as is Susanne's Appraisal Review Report, also published by the US Senate Finance Committee. Following this investigation, a new joint Legislative Bill was proposed: "The Charitable Conservation Easement Program Integrity Act", which enjoys bi-partisan support and is expected to become law. This legislation was highlighted in the Appraisal Institute's "Valuation" publication on P, 27 of the 3Q4Q 2020 issue. The three-year investigation prior to the Senate Report revolved around a single appraiser responsible for his report that Susanne reviewed, and he was also responsible for hundreds of other inflated appraisal reports. Claud Clark III turned in his appraisal certification in May 2019.
